

Chapter 3 - The Phrase - Study Guide with Additional Practice

Part One: Classifying Phrases

Directions:

For each sentence below, look at the italicized phrase. In the first blank, write if the phrase is a gerund phrase (GER), a participial phrase (PART), an infinitive phrase (INF), a prepositional phrase (PREP), or an appositive phrase (APP).

If it is an APP, leave the second blank empty.

If it is a PREP, write if it is working as an AJD or an ADV in the second blank.

If it is a GER, write if it is the subject (S), the direct object (DO), object of the preposition (OP), or predicate nominative (PN) in the second blank.

If it is a PART, write the word it is modifying in the second blank.

If it is an INF, write if it is an ADJ, N, or ADV in the second blank.
